Gaming



"Roblox is safe though, isn't it?"

Sadly, some of the games that should be safe for our children to play can be exploited. Our Police Youth Engagement Officer recently told about a game on Roblox called "The hated child"; it's essentially a way for children to send mean and nasty messages to another.

The best approach is to teach children how they can keep themselves safe when they're exposed to something like this.

Thinkuknow (the education team from the National Crime Agency's CEOP Command) suggest:

1. Talk with your child about gaming. Learn the games they like and the content and features of them so you can understand more about

how your child plays games and how appropriate the games are. You can use [NSPCC's online safety hub](#) to find out more about safer gaming.

2. Learn together. Use their resources to teach your child about safer gaming at all ages. For primary age children you can use our [Jessie & Friends](#) (ages 4-7) and [Play, Like, Share](#) (ages 8-10) resources.

3. Set boundaries and safety settings. [Internet Matters](#) provides step-by-step [guides](#) on this for each console or device.
